During the General Reunion Meeting it was announced the Association was incorporated under the laws of the State of Texas as a "not for profit" corporation and application has been made to the Internal Revenue Service for a ruling exempting the association from income taxes as a 501(c)(19) veterans organization under the IRS code which we hope to obtain by the end of 2004. The IRS reacted swiftly and issued a favorable ruling 09/24/2004, which granted

the requested exemption from taxes as a 501 (c)(19) veterans organization and will also grant donor deductibility.

The remaining major Association challenge is to obtain exemption from State of Texas Franchise fees and Sales Taxes on purchases to be utilized within the association. Application has been made to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts for these exemptions which is expected to be granted since the state normally follows the federal lead. Hopefully this will be approved by year's end.

- San Antonio was the home of USAFSS, the origin of our AMTs

s part of our charter and as a recognized veteran's organization as described by the Internal Revenue Service, I have been

selected by the AMTA Board of Directors to serve as the National Veterans' Service Officer for the AMTA.

As the AMTA VSO, I am available to answer questions concerning veteran's benefits, and assist or advise veterans on benefits available through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) or Department of Defense (DOD). My history has been as a County Veterans' Service Officer for the past eleven years. I am an accredited representative to the VA through the National Association of County Veterans' Service Officers.

Since being a County Veterans' Service Officer I have received training beyond that provided by the Veteran Administration to their benefits counselors you would contact if you called the VA Regional Office in your home state. I can provide you with the information and guidance you will need to apply for well deserved veteran's benefits.

I will be glad to help any AMTA member with veteran benefits questions or problems. I can guide you through the paperwork needed under various programs, even to the point of completing some forms using the Internet. Completed forms would require your signature and forwarded by you to your local VA Regional Office or Veterans organization representative. I will do everything I can to make the process as simple as possible for you to receive the benefits you EARNED by serving our country. I have contact information for many agencies and State Departments of Veterans' Affairs in every state.

I plan to keep information concerning changes in benefits updated on my web site for your review.
