number of burial benefits are available to former active duty and retired military members. I'll go over the basic facts, but remember you can get all the assistance you will need at the time of the veterans death from your local veterans service officer, the VA regional office and funeral directors. VA burial arrangements cannot be made in advance of a veterans death, but a few things can be done to prepare in advance.

Preparing in Advance

For Burial in a VA National Cemetery

Gravesites in <u>Department of Veterans</u> <u>Affairs</u> (VA) national cemeteries cannot be reserved in advance; however, reservations made prior to 1962 will be honored. Families are encouraged to prepare in advance by discussing cemetery options, collecting the veteran's military information including discharge papers, and by contacting the cemetery where burial is desired.

For Burial in a Private Cemetery

I suggest that if burial will be in a private cemetery and a Government headstone or marker will be requested for the Veteran's grave, that the family complete VA Form 40-1330, <u>Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker for Installation in a Private or State Veterans' Cemetery</u>, in advance and place it with the Veterans military discharge papers for use at the time of need.

For Burial in a State Veterans Cemetery

I suggest contacting the Department of Veterans Affairs in the state where the veteran is to be buried for the location of the nearest veterans cemetery and eligibility details.

Generally, a veteran discharged with other than a dishonorable discharge, his or her spouse and certain disabled child, can be buried in any National or State veterans cemetery at no cost. Burial Arlington Cemetery is controlled by the Army and is limited to military retirees, and certain other decorated veterans and government officials. Contact the VA or a service officer for details

A United States flag is provided, at no cost, to drape the casket or accompany the urn of a deceased Veteran who served honorably in the U. S. Armed Forces. It is furnished to honor the memory of a Veteran's military service to his or her country. VA will furnish the burial flag for memorialization for each veteran indicated below, other than a dishonorable discharge:

HOUSEHOLD TIPS.

COFFEE FILTERS

Coffee ..who knew! And you can buy 1,000 at the Tree for almost nothing.

1. Cover bowls or dishes when cooking in the microwave.

Coffee filters make excellent covers.

- 2. Clean windows and mirrors. Coffee filters are lint-free so they'll leave windows sparkling.
- 3. Protect China. Separate your good dishes by putting a coffee filter between each dish.
- 4. Filter broken cork from wine. If you break the cork when opening a wine bottle, filter the wine through a coffee filter.
- 5. Protect a cast-iron skillet. Place a coffee filter in the to absorb moisture and prevent rust.

- 9. Hold tacos. Coffee filters make convenient wrappers for messy foods.
- 10. Stop the soil from leaking out of a plant pot. Line a plant with a coffee filter to prevent the soil from going through drainage holes.
- 11. Prevent a Popsicle from dripping. Poke one or two holes as needed in a coffee filter.
- 12. Do you think we used expensive strips to wax eyebrows? Use strips of coffee filters.
- 13. Put a few in a plate and put your fried bacon, French fries, chicken fingers, etc on them. Soaks out all the grease.
- 14. Keep in the bathroom. They make great "razor nick fixers."
